VESTRY

Adult volunteers are desperately needed for the youth programs this fall. Unless more volunteers come forward, Sunday School will have one class for all elementary aged children and one class for junior high and high school students. Wednesday evenings will have one class for lower elementary, one for upper elementary, and one for combined junior high/high school.

An undesignated bequest of \$91,908 was left to the church. In accordance with long-standing policy, 10% was automatically transferred to the Perpetual Trust. The Vestry voted to transfer \$10,000 to the Education Scholarship Fund, \$5,000 to St. Nicholas-Noel to help them with unexpected repairs to their rectory, and \$5,000 to St. Matthew's-Ozark, which is experiencing financial difficulty. The remaining funds will be allocated after Vestry members have had time to pray about outreach ministries. If you have a suggestion, please talk with a Vestry member!

A bid from Pearson-Kelly was accepted to install a video intercom doorbell system. The Vestry also voted to sponsor the Maple Leaf Festival Quilt Show and the new Chamber Music Series at Pitt State. Our name and logo will be included in promotional materials for both events. The annual Stewardship drive will begin in late September with a breakfast, the date is that Please be thinking about your pledges for the upcoming year!

We are down \$55,000 for the year in our budget. As we are beginning to plan for the 2024 budget we ask that you try to stay current with your pledge. Thank you, Grace, for your faithfulness!

La fe en Dios se practica en comunidad espiritual.

La sociedad incrédula en la que vivimos regularmente afirma que la fe es un asunto privado. Esto no es cierto. Verdaderamente, la fe es un asunto personal tal como Jesús le dijo a Nicodemo: "Tienen que nacer de nuevo" (Jn. 3:7). Sin embargo, una fe personal no es una fe privada. La verdadera fe se vive en comunidad espiritual con los demás. En el Antiguo Testamento, la comunidad de fe era la nación de Israel. En el Nuevo Testamento, es la iglesia, una nueva comunidad en Cristo que trasciende el género, raza, y estado (Gál. 3:28). Vivir en fe en Cristo es vivir en comunión con la iglesia.

La iglesia es la casa de Dios. Pablo, al escribirle a Timoteo en Éfeso, llamó a la iglesia "la casa de Dios, que es la iglesia del Dios vivo, columna y sostén de la verdad" (1 Ti. 3:15). En la salvación nacemos de nuevo y somos adoptados en la familia de Dios. Pero un niño recién nacido necesita formar parte de un hogar para alimentarse, tener compañerismo, y protección. La iglesia es el hogar de la fe (Gál. 6:10). Más que eso, es la casa de Dios. Rechazar a la iglesia es rechazar los medios de cuidado que el Señor ha provisto para sus hijos redimidos.

La membresía de la iglesia brinda seguridad de salvación. Un cristiano es aquel que ha profesado una fe salvífica en el Señor Jesucristo. No obstante, para que haya una verdadera seguridad, esa profesión personal debe hacerse delante de la iglesia. En las cartas del Nuevo Testamento, las dos marcas esenciales de la verdadera conversión son la fe en el Señor Jesucristo y el amor por todos los santos. La comunión cristiana es tan esencial para la verdadera seguridad como la fe personal. El amor por los santos demuestra fe en Cristo. "Nosotros sabemos que hemos pasado de muerte a vida porque amamos a los hermanos escribió el apóstol Juan. El que no ama permanece en muerte" (1 Jn. 3:14).

La iglesia está espiritualmente unida a Jesucristo. En los Evangelios, Jesús le dijo a los que serían sus discípulos que lo siguieran. Sin embargo, la relación actual entre Cristo y sus seguidores es mayor, más profunda, y más alta que ésta: "Cristo en ustedes, la esperanza de la gloria" (Col. 1:27). Ninguna otra religión se expresa de esa forma sobre la relación entre su líder y sus seguidores. Esta es la unión espiritual entre Cristo y la iglesia; estamos en Cristo y Cristo está en nosotros. Esta unión espiritual con Cristo es lo que nos une como iglesia. La presencia permanente del Rey Dador de Vida reside dentro de cada uno de nosotros y nos ha hecho uno en Cristo.

With the season of Creation being now through the month of September and concluding with our Blessing of Animals on October 4th, I find it only appropriate to share the interesting and little known story of Saint Guinefort. This is one of my favorite stories in Christian tradition and I love sharing it around this time of year every year. Saint Guinefort, the saint that was never really a saint. In fact, the saint that never was - was not a human either. But that is getting ahead of the story. The story of Saint Guinefort is a folk lore story of the region around Lyon, France in the 13th century. This is a tragic story of a greyhound and a knight. Guinefort the greyhound was the beloved dog of its master, a knight who lived in a castle near Lyon. One day the knight went on a hunting trip and left Guinefort to watch over his infant child. When the knight had returned, the house was eerily quiet, and the nursery room of his child was destroyed where Guinefort was ready to meet his master with a mouthful of bloody teeth. The knight thought the worst had happened and that it was Guineforts fault, and struck Guinefort dead on the spot in a fit of rage. But then, a child began to cry and the knight found his child with the dead body of a snake next to him gnarled and mangled by dog bites. Guinefort had saved the child from the snake. In sorrowful realization of the mistake he had made, the knight took Guineforts body and placed it at the bottom of an empty well, stones covering it, and trees planted around it making a shrine for the greyhound. Soon, hearing of the heroic deeds of Guinefort, the locals began to visit this shrine and venerate Guinefort as a saint, especially the parents of sick children. This local folk following of Guinefort led to the church deeming the greyhound as a harmful legend. Early protestant churches pointed to "Saint" Guinefort as an example of the errors of the Roman Catholic Church and eventually the Roman Church adopted a similar stance on this cult following of Guinefort to squash the following once and for all. But this failed and the tradition of visiting Saint Guineforts Wood continued well into the 20th century with the last known veneration for a sick child occurring in the 1940s. Regardless of where you stand on the issue of Guineforts sainthood or lack thereof, the story of Guinefort is a powerful one for us all to remember. Be not quick to judge or assume the worst, for often it is then that we will be humbled. Not to mention this superb example of the powerful bond between humanity and Gods other creatures – a dog willing to stand between a deadly adversary and an innocent little child. I hope you enjoyed this story of Saint Guinefort and may God bless all those special creatures in your life. Saintly or otherwise.
