February 2025 From the Desk of The Rev. Joe Pierjok

In our Anglican tradition, we hold dear the mystery and beauty of God's love—a love that reaches beyond understanding and embraces each of us just as we are. This love is the foundation of our faith, inviting us into a relationship with God that is transformative, unconditional, and freely given through grace. As we reflect on God's love, we come to see it as both a gift to be received and a calling to be shared with others. Our understanding of God's love is rooted in the Incarnation: the Word became flesh and lived among us in Jesus Christ. God entered our world, our struggles, and our joys, not as a distant observer, but as one of us. Through Jesus, we see God's love in action—in his compassion, his healing touch, his forgiveness, and his sacrifice. This self-giving love invites us to experience God in deeply personal ways and to see that nothing separates us from this love. As Paul reminds us in Romans, "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers... will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38-39). This assurance is a powerful comfort, reminding us that God's love is constant and unshakeable, even in life's most difficult times. In Anglicanism, we also learn to see the world as sacramental, infused with God's presence. This means we are invited to recognize God's love not only in the extraordinary but in the everyday—in the beauty of creation, in our relationships, and in the acts of kindness we give and receive. Just as we encounter God in the Eucharist, we can also encounter Him in the simple moments of our lives, if we open our hearts to see Him. This sacramental vision calls us to approach life with gratitude and reverence, trusting that God's love is all around us, even in unexpected places. God's love is also profoundly marked by grace. We do not need to earn it or prove ourselves worthy; God loves us unconditionally. The Anglican tradition, through the words of the Book of Common Prayer, beautifully reminds us that God's "property is always to have mercy." This truth can be life-changing: it frees us from striving to earn God's favor and opens us to receive His love with humility and joy. We are then invited to reflect that love in our own lives, embodying the mercy, kindness, and compassion of Christ in how we treat one another. So, how do we live as people grounded in the love of God? First, we receive it. In our prayers, in Scripture, and in worship, we open ourselves to experience the depth of God's love. Then, we let it transform us. Perhaps this means extending forgiveness, reaching out to someone in need, or simply living with greater patience and understanding. Whatever shape it takes, our lives become a response to God's love, a way of reflecting His light in the world. As we continue in our journey of faith together, may we grow ever deeper in the knowledge of God's love, letting it guide us, strengthen us, and bring us peace. And may our community shine as a beacon of that love, sharing God's grace with all who come through our doors and all whom we meet.

Come fomentar relaciones saludables de amor y amistad

Promover el diálogo: las mejores relaciones son aquellas en las que se puede hablar de cualquier cosa. Por ello es importantísimo saber qué es lo que le preocupa al otro, ayudar y escuchar. Aceptar las diferencias: la relación se enriquece cuando se respetan las individualidades de cada uno. También hay que entender las frustraciones del otro y dejarle el espacio necesario. Cómo conseguir estos objetivos: 1. Escuchar. 2. Mostrarnos interesados. 3. No forzar los lazos. Las relaciones de amor y de amistad, aunque poseen ciertos aspectos comunes, tienen también algunos diferentes. Según el análisis por temas para el amor de Neufeld y Stephenson (1959), por ejemplo, las relaciones de amor son notablemente superiores a las de amistad en los ámbitos de las actitudes emocionales (relaciones emocionales) e interdependencia miedo de separación. Las relaciones de amistad, por el contrario, son superiores en materias tales como apoyo mutuo (relaciones constructivas), actividades compartidas y similitudes en intereses (relaciones sociales). Las relaciones de amor generan un clima afectivo que influye sobre la resolución de los problemas cotidianos, facilitando la adaptación de la persona a su contexto. Las personas apegadas tienen un estilo de cognición, emoción y conducta, junto con un estilo de interacción y de afrontamiento, que mantiene la estabilidad del apego y les permite funcionar con eficacia. Por otra parte, mucha confianza, sopesar, resolver los problemas, el cambio, la lucha contra las enfermedades y la inversión en los propios retos. El amor y la amistad son dos realidades profundamente distintas, pero cuyo estudio puede ayudar a reflexionar acerca de la esencia de las mismas. Añadiremos después las Leyes de Amor y sus características. ¿Cómo se interrelacionan amor y amistad? Según Erich Fromm, en su libro 'El arte de amar', "nadie puede ser amigo del otro si primero no es amigo de sí mismo; el amor y la amistad no son dos cosas distintas, sino que uno es más intenso que otro". Para explicar su parecer, Fromm plantea afirmaciones como "si no soy capaz de amar mi 'ser humano', es decir, si no soy capaz de experimentar una actitud de respeto, cuidado, responsabilidad hacia mí, el amor del otro no será más que proyección y egoísmo". "El amor es el único medio para eliminar nuestra soledad, el único". Sólo a través de él podemos conocer y ser conocidos, sólo a través del amor podemos vernos tal como somos. El amor y las relaciones de amistad sanas y que nos ayudan a crecer tienen, para la psicología, un importante papel en el aumento de la calidad de vida y del bienestar emocional de las personas. Un ser amado (amigo o pareja) puede en los momentos difíciles ser la oreja que nos escucha, el hombro donde reposar y la perspectiva desprejuiciada que necesitamos. La amistad y el amor están presentes en todas las culturas.

During the month of February, we will be having another book study. This book study will focus on John Bunyan's The Pilgrim Progress. You can participate in this series at any point, even if you did not sign up for it. This book study will be every Wednesday night in February, beginning at 7pm here at the church. You may read whichever version of the book you would like, however we have selected Alan Vermilye's updated version of the book. The following is a description of The Pilgrim's Progress, "The story chronicles the epic adventure of a man named Christian who leaves his home in the City of Destruction and begins a life-long quest to the Celestial City. Set against the backdrop of a hazardous journey, this powerful drama unfolds as Christian's adventures lead him into fascinating lands and encounters with interesting people who either help or hinder his progress along a narrow way. With a gallery of memorable characters and visits to colorful places, Bunyan's allegorical narrative describes one man's extraordinary adventure on his journey to faith." (Amazon description)
